
Mower Competition





The following trophies will be presented by the Y.P. Shows Association to the exhibitors gaining the highest aggregate number of points at the 2025/2026 round of affiliated Shows. Exhibitors must exhibit at two out of three of the following: Copper Coast, Maitland and SYP Shows, to be eligible to win the Association Trophies.

THE R.A.H.S. TROPHY: Conditions are the same as the other trophies except that:
NO points will be allotted for any class with less than two exhibitors.

Most successful exhibitor trophies are awarded to the exhibitor gaining the highest aggregate of points in a section, calculated as 5 points for first prize, 3 points for second prize and 1 point for third prize irrespective of the number of exhibitors in a Class (except where otherwise stated). In the event of a tie, the winner will be decided on count back plus champions.

Receipted entry forms can be picked up from the Secretary's Office on Show Day. These receipted forms must be shown to stewards before exhibits can be staged.

YOUNG RURAL AMBASSADOR and RURAL AMBASSADOR AWARDS

Are you young and enthusiastic about rural life?

Are you involved in your local community?

Do you enjoy travelling and meeting new people?

This competition may be for you.

Maitland A H & F Society is sponsoring the local Young Ambassador Competition with a \$50 prize and the Rural Ambassador Competition with a \$100 prize.

Conducted in conjunction with the Agricultural Societies Council of SA with the aim of highlighting the importance of youth in rural South, and particularly the show movement.

Young Rural Ambassador Award: entrants aged between 16 and 19 years of age.

Rural Ambassador Award: entrants aged between 20 and 30 years of age.

The award provides a great opportunity to give young people a forum to express their views through education and experience and develop closer links with the agricultural industries in South Australia.

The Rural Ambassador Award is to identify and encourage enthusiastic, skillful, industrious and unselfish young people. Awardees attend country shows, are invited to be involved in shows and events and may even travel interstate or internationally to learn about other rural communities and shows. They meet a wide range of new people and can make lifelong friends along the way. There are so many opportunities.

Entrants are first selected at their local country show (Maitland Show) to represent that Show at the association level. The YP Association includes Maitland, SYP and Copper Coast Shows. The YP Association winners are then presented at the State Final to be conducted during the 2026 Royal Adelaide Show. The winner of the State Final for the Rural Ambassador only is the award winner for that year and will represent South Australia at the National Rural Ambassador Final.

All State finalists will receive an RM Williams clothing package and be accommodated and hosted by SA Country Shows during their period of attendance at the Royal Adelaide Show. The winner of the State final will receive \$5,000 in prize money and the two runners up will receive \$1,000 each from the RA & HS of SA Show Society Foundation.

MAITLAND A. H. AND F. SOCIETY

The Show Society was formed on Saturday, 22nd June 1878, at a meeting at the Hotel Maitland. Its aim was to hold an annual show for "the education, instruction and entertainment of all concerned." The meeting elected Thomas Bowman as President, John Moloney and Henry Lamshed as Vice Presidents, and Henry Lousada as Secretary, to act 'with an influential Committee.' The name chosen was Yorke Valley Agricultural, Horticultural and Floricultural Society. It resulted in the first show being held three months later on Thursday, 26th September 1878, on the property of Mr. Thomas O'Brien, adjacent to the Ardrossan Road. The classes included Ploughing, Horse Stock, Cattle, Sheep, Pigs, Machinery, Wheat, Farmyard and Dairy Produce. Admission was one shilling (10 cents), £100 (\$200) was offered in prize money and a profit of £50 (\$100) was made. A dinner following the first show was held at the Yorke Valley Hotel.

The show the following year was held on Thomas Bowman's property adjacent to the town and then, in 1880, the Show Society was granted five acres of the parklands. A marquee was erected for the flowers, agricultural and dairy produce, and the Maitland Brass Band contributed to the program. The site, including the cricket ground, was fenced and stock yards, sheep and pig pens erected, giving the Show Society ten acres of enclosed space. The name was then changed to the Maitland Agricultural, Horticultural and Floricultural Society.

On the 1st of October 1902, Mr. W. J. Shannon, MP for Yorke Peninsula, declared open 'a handsome and commodious structure' - a pavilion which cost £300 (\$600). The front had two wing towers, the space between had an outside and inside balcony.

World War I raged from 1914 to 1918 and in 1916 there was a suggestion to abandon the Show, but the decision was made to carry on. However, all profits were given to the war effort with the luncheon catered for by the Red Cross.

"The best display of sheep in the history of the Maitland Show" was how the scribe in "The Maitland Watch" recorded the 1922 Show.

The Fiftieth Jubilee of the show was celebrated on the 19th October 1927. On the day prior to the Show, a civic reception was held by the Mayor, Mr. H. T. Harris, followed by a banquet at the Maitland Institute to honour the Maitland A. H. & F. Society pioneers. An Old Time Ball was held at night and the following day a tour of the district, led by Mr. P. C. J. Marschall.

A new brick pavilion was opened on 21st October 1936, by Mr. (later Sir) Baden Pattinson, MP. The contract for £781 (\$1,562) was let to Messrs Klæbe and Gordon, of Maitland, with H. G. Altus doing the brickwork. All donors' names were placed in a glass bottle and built into the wall.

During World War II, 1939 – 1945, the Show Society continued to function more as a patriotic carnival with all proceeds to wartime charities. At the 1945 show returned soldiers were honoured.

An Autumn Show, together with Sheep Dog Trials, was held in 1949 in addition to the October event. Another held the following year left the show society with a debt and Autumn shows were discontinued.

The date of the show, after being the third Wednesday of October for many years, was changed around this time to the second Saturday in October, then, in 1956 to the first Saturday of that month.

The Scout Hall was built on the grounds in 1953. Late in 1956 work started building the Band Hall on the grounds. New sheep yards and poultry coops were built, cattle pens renewed, and Olympic jumping added to the horse events. The Rural Youth Club held a Show Night Dance with half the proceeds going to the Maitland Show Society.

Junior Membership was introduced in 1963, with 35 young members joining at 3/- (30 cents) each.

The 1970's saw the introduction of the Show Girl Competition, the building of the School Shed and the Show Society joining the Equestrian Federation of Australia. The Centenary Show in 1977 was held over two days.

1983 saw the establishment of the 'Elias Smith Arena' on the eastern side of the grounds. Later, it became an oval and the venue for horse events. By the mid 1980's the machinery display was valued at 3½ million dollars. A Barley Festival was held on Central Yorke Peninsula in 1988, and the Show was scheduled as part of the week's program.

Due to the absence of a secretary in 1991, no show was held. In 1992, the show became an Autumn Show. The program changed to include a Street Parade and an evening Fire Works Display. This Show was held in April, then later, changed to a Wednesday in March. The 20th of March 1994, saw the opening of the Lion's Annexe on the south side of the pavilion by the Member for Goyder, John Meier. Largely funded by the Maitland District Lion's Club, it provides undercover display space for exhibits on Show Day.

The Maitland Showground has become the venue for the Netball and Tennis Clubs, and they opened their Maitland Community Sports' Club building there in October 2007. This was also the year in which the showgrounds became a campground after a need was identified in the community.

Sheep Dog Trials are held annually. They are catered for by members in the Pumpkin Kitchen at the pavilion which has long been providing meals at the Show.

In 2010 a laptop was purchased along with a program called "Ag Show". This program, which was created specifically for Agricultural Shows revolutionised the recording of entries and the processing of prize monies. The show also now has its own website.

Who could forget the strong winds, thunder, lightning and rain that dampened the proceedings at the 2012 Show? No need for the fireworks that night! April 2013, saw solar panels installed on the roof of the pavilion. The outdoor entertainment area has been upgraded to include permanent cover over that area.

In 2016, after many comments from the community, it was decided to trial holding show day on the Saturday of the March long weekend. That proved successful with many visitors through the gates. The local community, however, wanted to enjoy the long weekend away, so show day was moved from the long weekend. It is now held on the third Saturday in March.

In the last few years, the Pumpkin Kitchen has been completely renovated and now boasts modern appliances and a fantastic space for conferences and training days. Also, a perfect space for family gatherings and celebrations.

Our 2025 show will be one not soon forgotten. The day before saw the committee forging ahead despite there being no power, internet or telephone service and temperatures around 40 degrees. As they say, "the show must go on" and go on it did. Show day 2025 was run completely on a generator with temperatures soaring to 43 degrees. Many of our food stalls and other exhibitors were unable to source their stock, which added to the challenges of the day. Thankfully the local Shed Men group came on board and ran a barbecue for us.

2025 has also seen a long overdue complete renovation of the secretary's office.

In recent years we have seen a much-needed rise in gate takings as the entertainment has been increased with the very popular Motorbike Stunt Team, V8 entertainment, as some examples, and the grand finale fireworks. Many thanks to the local businesses who provide the sponsorship for these events.

To an ever-progressive Show Society, the community owes their sincere thanks and gratitude to the men and women who have worked so hard over 148 years to provide a showcase for the Central Yorke Peninsula area.

The Maitland Auto Preservation Society (MAPS) was formed in 1985 by local motoring enthusiasts.

Members' cars are regularly displayed at the Maitland Show, with a trophy awarded by the Show Committee for the best presented vehicle being displayed.

The early days saw a scheme to create a working garage museum. This building is now used for weekly food and craft markets.

In 2014 the Club took on the funding of a mural for the Heart of Maitland area, illustrating a Talbot car (one of the earliest registered cars in the Maitland District) and other historic vehicles. The funding for this project came from a bequest of three historic motorcycles and three trucks in 2005. The International truck was donated to the Maitland Men's Shed for restoration. All remaining items sold.

Whilst we use the old Maitland Town Hall Archives Room as storage, our General Meetings are held in the comfort of the Performing Art Centre at the Central Yorke School on the first Thursday of each month, at 8.00pm Daylight Saving, 7.30pm other months. Tea, coffee and supper are served after meetings. We have guest speakers as they become available. The meeting business is never too onerous! Visitors are most welcome, with no obligation to join.

We have a busy, year-round program of events, including weekends away, midweek runs and joint events with other clubs.

Our membership is at an all-time high with approximately 300 members from all over the Yorke Peninsula and beyond. Between us, we own over 200 old vehicles, the majority of which are in regular use, or undergoing restoration. Our cars range from the wooden wheeled cars of the 1920's to the ever popular Holdens and Fords and more exotic cars of the 1980's and 1990's. We have no age or ownership restrictions on members' cars and it is not necessary to own an historic vehicle.

Membership of our club allows the privilege of the SA conditional registration scheme for vehicles 25 years or older, subject to eligibility.

250 grams butter	60 grams chopped red glace cherries
250 grams dark brown sugar	60 grams mixed peel
6 eggs	60 grams chopped almonds
250 grams sultanas	375 grams plain flour
250 grams raisins	1 teaspoon baking powder
200 grams currants	1 teaspoon mixed spice
100 grams dates	200 mls sherry or brandy

METHOD

Chop fruits, mix together and soak in the sherry or brandy overnight. Sift together flour, baking powder and spice. Cream together butter and sugar. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition, then alternatively add the fruit and flour and lastly the chopped nuts. Mix thoroughly. Place mixture into a well prepared 19 - 22cm square tin and bake in a slow oven for approx. 3 - 3½ hours.

Note: Fruit should be cut to the size of currants

HINTS FOR THE ABOVE COMPETITION:

1. Cake should be cooked evenly all over—top, bottom and sides should be of even colour. Points to be deducted for uneven cooking.





**REGULATIONS
OF
MAITLAND AGRICULTURAL, HORTICULTURAL AND
FLORICULTURAL SOCIETY INC.**

1. Subscriber's privileges:-
 - (a) Each subscriber to be a member of the Society with a vote and a voice in its proceedings.
 - (b) Each ticket admits the bearer to the pavilion and grounds during the Current Show.
 - (c) A subscription of \$20.00 entitles a member to one member's ticket and one complimentary ticket. Junior members \$2.00.
 - (d) Life Membership Fees:-
 - A person 30 years or under 10 years Annual members Subscription plus \$75.00.
 - A person 31-40 years 10 years Annual members Subscription plus \$50.00.
 - A person 41-50 years 10 years Annual members Subscription plus \$25.00.
 - A person over 50 years 10 years Annual members Subscription.
2. Admission to the ground and pavilion: Adults \$15.00; Children of school age \$5.00; under school age, free.
3. Entries close as per detail on each Section and should be made on the form provided.
4. All entry fees are to be paid prior to lodgment of exhibits.
5. The Show building will be open for the reception of exhibits at 7:00am on the day of the show and no entries will be admitted into the building after 8:30am. The building will be cleared of all people except the Judges and Stewards at 8.30am sharp in preparation for judging to commence.
6. General entry into pavilion on completion of judging.
7. Stock shall be on the ground not later than 8:30am on the day of the Show.
8. All exhibits shall be the bona fide property of the exhibitor. All pot plants shall be established in pots and shall have been in the possession of the exhibitor for at least three months previously. No exhibit entered in the name of more than one person unless a bona fide firm shall be qualified to receive a prize.
9. Each exhibit will have its proper name attached where practicable and any exhibitor giving a wrong description of his or her exhibit with the intention of deceiving or defrauding the Society shall be debarred from exhibiting at the next Show and the particulars of the case shall be published in the Society's proceedings.
10. All exhibitors shall place their exhibits in the space allotted to them by the Committee of Management. Arrangement of exhibits commences at 7:00am sharp and concludes at 8.30am.

11. Protests against awards shall be lodged (in writing) with the Secretary before 4:00pm on the day of the show and shall be accompanied by the deposit of \$5.00 which shall be forfeited to the Society should the protest not be entertained.
12. Prizes and competitors names may be affixed to the exhibit after the Judges have made their awards.
13. The signing of the entry form for the exhibit is accepted by the Committee as a guarantee that the specified animal is free from all diseases as far as is known to the owner and in case of infectious disease being spread through or by exhibits the exhibitor only not the Society shall be held responsible therefore.
14. Exhibitors are responsible for the actions, doings or sayings of their authorised managers, agents or attendants.
15. The Society shall not be held responsible under any circumstances whatever for the exhibits for any damage or injuries thereto or for any loss or misdeliver thereof.
16. The Committee will appoint skillful persons as Experts and Judges who in forming their opinion will particularly attend to the instructions to be delivered for their guidance.
17. All people causing annoyance by loud comments on the decisions of the judges or by unseemly or insulting behaviour shall, after having been cautioned by a member of the Committee or Secretary, be expelled from the Show grounds.
18. All entries are received on condition that in the event of a protest the Steward's decision shall be final without recourse.
19. No tents, booths or hawkers shall be allowed on the grounds without permission of the Secretary.
20. All prizes not claimed within two months after the Show will be absolutely forfeited to the Society.
21. Exhibits to be removed between 5.30pm and 8pm unless pre-arranged with convenor.
22. Any prize awarded by the Judges which may be withheld in consequence of a valid protest will be forfeited to the Society.
23. Any award made by the Judges in contravention of the regulations of the Society may be revised by the Committee.
24. The Judges are empowered to withhold prizes where exhibits are considered unworthy. They may award second and third prizes.
25. The Judges shall come on the ground at the time appointed and commence their duties at once. The Judges must mark against each prize in the List the number of exhibitor to whom they award each prize.
