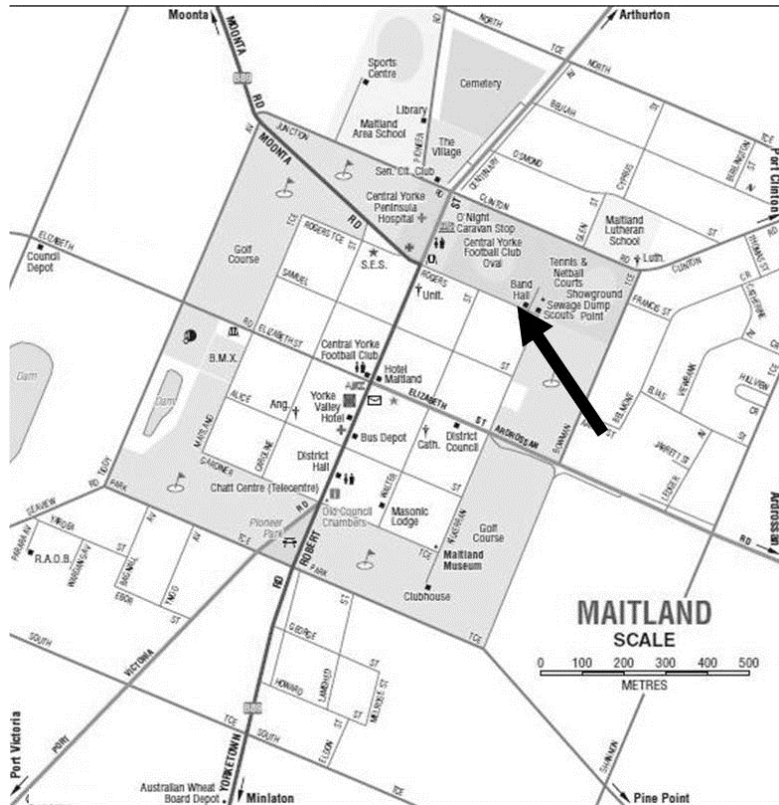

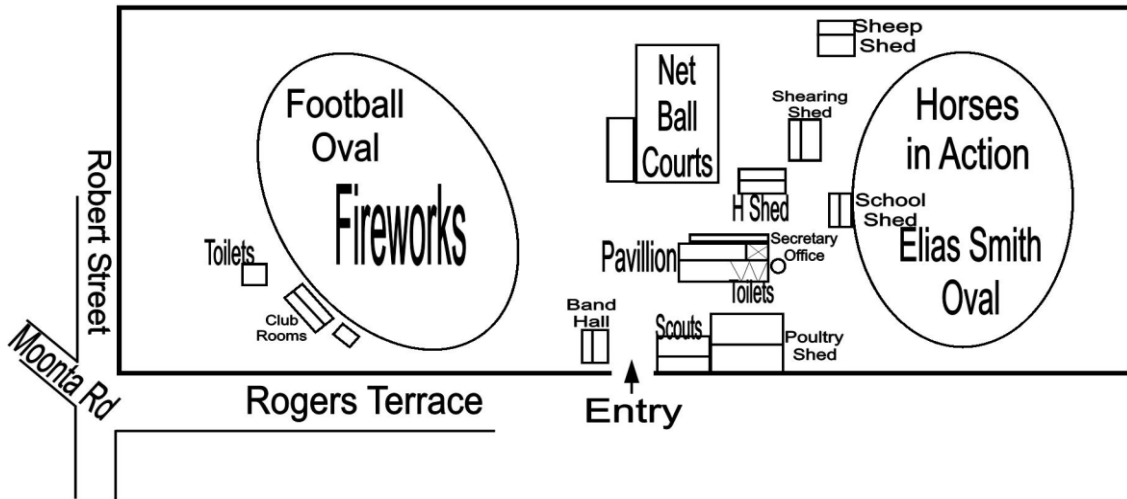

Most successful exhibitor trophies are awarded to the exhibitor gaining the highest aggregate of points in a section, calculated as 5 points for first prize, 3 points for second prize and 1 point for third prize irrespective of the number of exhibitors in a Class (except where otherwise stated). In case of a tie, winner will be decided on count back plus champions.

Receipted entry forms can be picked up from the Secretary's office in the Pavilion on Show Day. These receipted forms must be shown to the Stewards before exhibits can be staged.

Prize winners are requested to collect their prize money from 5:30pm onwards on Show Day.

YOUNG RURAL AMBASSADOR and RURAL AMBASSADOR AWARDS Maitland A.H.& F. Society is sponsoring Local Young Ambassador \$50.00, and the Rural Ambassador, \$100.00.

Conducted in conjunction with Agricultural Societies Council of SA with the aim of highlighting the importance of youth in rural SA and in particular, show movement.

The Young section is open to entrants aged between 16 years and 19 years inclusive, whilst the Rural Ambassador section is for entrants aged between 20 years and 30 years inclusive,

The Award is to identify & encourage enthusiastic, skilful, industrious & unselfish young people. Also to give young people a forum to express their views through education & experience & to develop closer links with the agricultural industries.

The Award structure for all entrants is firstly to be selected at the Country Show Society level to represent that Society at the Association level. The YP Association involves Maitland, Minlaton & Kadina Shows.

The Association winners then are presented at the State Final to be conducted during the 2019 Royal Adelaide Show.

The winner of the State Final is the Young or Rural Ambassador Award winner for that year, and will represent South Australia at the National Young & Rural Ambassador Final.

MAITLAND A. H. AND F. SOCIETY

The Maitland Agricultural, Horticultural and Floricultural Society in 2019 celebrates 141 years of active service in the community.

The Show Society was formed on Saturday, 22nd June, 1878, at a meeting at the Hotel Maitland.

Its aim was to hold an annual Show for "the education, instruction and entertainment of all concerned." The meeting elected Thomas Bowman as President, John Moloney and Henry Lamshed as Vice Presidents, and Henry Lousada as Secretary, to act 'with an influential Committee.' The name chosen was Yorke Valley Agricultural, Horticultural and Floricultural Society.

It resulted in the first Show being held three months later on Thursday, 26th September, 1878, on the property of Mr. Thomas O'Brien, Section 116, Hundred of Maitland, adjacent to the Ardrossan Road. The classes included Ploughing, Horse Stock, Cattle, Sheep, Pigs, Machinery, Wheat, Farmyard and Dairy Produce. Admission was one shilling (10 cents) and £100 (\$200) was offered in prize money and a profit of £50 (\$100) was made. A Dinner following the first Show was held at the Yorke Valley Hotel.

The Show the following year was held on Thomas Bowman's property adjacent to the town and then, in 1880, the Show Society was granted five acres of the parklands. A marquee was erected for the flowers, agricultural and dairy produce, and the Maitland Brass Band contributed to the programme. The site, including the Cricket ground, was fenced and stock yards, sheep and pig pens erected, giving the Show Society ten acres of enclosed space. The name was then changed to the Maitland Agricultural, Horticultural and Floricultural Society.

On 1st October, 1902, Mr. W. J. Shannon, M P for Yorke Peninsula, declared open 'a handsome and commodious structure' - a pavilion which cost £300 (\$600). It was 100 feet by 40 feet and 10 feet high. The front had two wing towers, 14 feet square and 20 feet high; the space between had an outside and inside balcony.

Several years later, 1909, marked the advent of the motor car as a means of transport, with 35 in attendance. By 1912, there were 150, and in 1926 there were 1,200 cars.

World War I raged from 1914 to 1918 and in 1916 there was a suggestion to abandon the Show, but the decision was made to carry on. However, all profits were given to the war effort with the luncheon catered for by the Red Cross.

"The best display of sheep in the history of the Maitland Show" was how the scribe in "*The Maitland Watch*" recorded the 1922 Show. Application was made for an additional grant of parklands but the Municipal Association said that the Town Council could not lease more than ten acres. So, in an arrangement with the Maitland Corporation, four acres including the oval, were taken over by the Recreation Reserve Committee, and the Show Society extended its boundary to include four more acres, giving them the use of fourteen acres.

The Fiftieth Jubilee of the Show was celebrated in 1927. On the day prior to the Show, a civic reception was held by the Mayor, Mr. H. T. Harris, followed by a banquet at the Maitland Institute to honour the Maitland A. H. & F. Society pioneers. Show day was 19th October. An Old Time Ball was held at night and the following day a tour of the district, led by Mr. P. C. J. Marschall.

A new brick pavilion was opened on 21st October, 1936, by Mr. (later Sir) Baden Pattinson, M P. It was 140 feet long by 40 feet wide. The contract for £781 (\$1,562) was let to Messrs Klæbe and Gordon, of Maitland, with H. G. Altus doing the brickwork. All donors names were placed in a glass bottle and built into the wall.

During World War II, 1939 - 1945, the Show Society continued to function more as a Patriotic Carnival with all proceeds divided between the Red Cross, Comforts Fund and other wartime charities. At the 1945 Show the returned soldiers were honoured.

In 1946, the Section for Agricultural Machinery was discontinued but an agricultural machinery display was put on by local machinery agents. The following year the Draught Horse Section was deleted and a Shearing Competition was introduced.

When the Maitland Preschool Kindergarten began in 1947, the Show Society granted them use of the pavilion on condition that they vacated the building for a week at Show time.

An Autumn Show, together with Sheep Dog Trials, was held in 1949, in addition to the October event. Another held the next year left the Show Society with a debt of £7/10/-, (\$15.00) and they were discontinued.

The date of the Show, after being the third Wednesday of October for many years was changed around this time to the second Saturday in October, then, in 1956 to the first Saturday of that month.

The Scout Hall was built on the grounds in 1953. This building was extended in 1966. Late in 1956 work started on building the Band Hall on the grounds.

Reticulated water was laid on to the grounds in the late 1950's. New sheep yards and poultry coops were built, cattle pens renewed and Olympic jumping added to the horse events. The Rural Youth Club held a Show Night Dance with half the proceeds going to the Show Society.

Improvements to the ground and facilities during the 1960's included an office at the pavilion, a verandah area, 40 feet by 20 feet added to the north side, a new shed to house the pig entries, additional poultry cages (entries now numbering 850 to 900) and a new brick toilet block. Junior Membership was introduced in 1963, with 35 young members joining at 3/- (30 cents) each. The plan of the Showgrounds was printed in the Show Book for the first time in 1968.

The 1970's saw the introduction of the Show Girl Competition, the building of the School Shed, and the Show Society joining the Equestrian Federation of Australia. The Centenary Show in 1977 was held over two days.

1983 saw the establishment of the 'Elias Smith Arena', an area 80 yards by 50 yards, on the eastern side of the grounds. Later, it became an oval and the venue for the horse events. By the mid 1980's the machinery display was valued at 3½ million dollars. A Barley Festival was held on Central Yorke Peninsula in 1988 and the Show was scheduled as part of the week's programme.

Due to the absence of a secretary in 1991, no Show was held. Then, in 1992, it became an Autumn Show. The programme changed to include a midday Street Parade and an evening Fire Works display. This Show was held in April, then later, changed to a Wednesday in March.

The 20th March, 1994, saw the opening of the Lion's Annexe on the south side of the pavilion by the Member for Goyder, John Meier. Largely funded by the Maitland & District Lion's Club, it provides undercover display space for exhibits on Show Day.

The Maitland Showground has become the venue for the Netball and Tennis Clubs and they opened their Maitland Community Sports' Club building there in October, 2007. The Caravan Park is also located on the ground. Two years later showers were installed for the campers.

The Show Society built new toilets at the pavilion and more undercover space to provide for the ever increasing exhibitors. Sheep Dog Trials are held annually. They are catered for by members in the Pumpkin Kitchen at the pavilion which has long been providing meals at the Show. The last few years have seen the Pumpkin Kitchen upgraded, with new mouse proof cupboards, new grills and rangehoods and a commercial grade dishwasher installed.

With the ever increasing push for emailing and websites, etc., a laptop was purchased in 2010 along with a programme called "Ag Show", for the use of the office staff. This programme was created specifically for Agricultural Shows and greatly improves the speed by which entries can be recorded. On Show Day all the prize winners' names are entered into the computer and it calculates the point totals and prize winnings for everyone. The Show also has its own website.

Who could forget the strong winds, thunder, lightning and rain that dampened the proceedings at the 2012 Show. No need for the fireworks that night!

April, 2013, saw the solar panels installed on the roof of the pavilion. The outdoor entertainment area has been upgraded to include a permanent cover over that area.

The last few years have seen a much needed rise in gate takings as the entertainment has been increased with the very popular Australian Pig Racing and Diving Team, Whip Industries Motorbike Stunt Team, V8 entertainment, etc, and the grand finale fireworks. Many thanks to the local businesses who provide the sponsorship for these events.

In 2016, after many comments from people, it was decided to trial having the Show Day on the Saturday of the March long weekend. That has been very successful with 1/3 more people through the gate; the long weekend bringing many visitors who were spending time on Yorke Peninsula!

To an ever progressive Show Society, the community owes their sincere thanks and gratitude to the men and women who have worked so hard over 141 years to provide a show case for the Central Yorke Peninsula area.

The early days saw a scheme to create a working garage museum. This building is now used for weekly food and craft markets.

In 2014 the club took on the funding of a mural for the Heart of Maitland area, illustrating a Talbot car (one of the earliest registered cars in the Maitland District) and other historic vehicles. The funding for this project came from a bequest of three historic motorcycles and three trucks in 2005. The International truck was donated to the Maitland Men's Shed for restoration. All remaining items sold.

Whilst we use the old Maitland Town Hall Archives Room as storage, our General Meetings are held in the comfort of the Performing Art Centre at the Central Yorke School. Our meetings are held on the first Thursday of each month, at 8pm. Tea, coffee and supper is served after meetings. We have guest speakers as they become available. The meeting business is never too onerous! Visitors are most welcome, with no obligation to join.

We have a busy, year round program of events, both close to home and further afield, including weekends away and joint events with other clubs.

Our membership is at an all time high with approximately 140 couples, families and individuals from all over the Yorke Peninsula and more distant. Between us, we own over 150 old vehicles, the majority of which are in regular use, or undergoing restoration. Our cars range from the wooden wheeled cars of the 1920's to the ever popular Holden and Fords and more exotic cars of the 1980's and 1990's. We have no age or ownership restrictions of members' cars and it is not necessary to own an historic vehicle.

Membership of our club allows the privilege of the SA special registration scheme for vehicles manufactured before 1988, provided vehicles meet the terms of the TSA Conditional Registration Scheme.

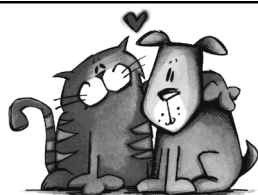

250 grams sultanas	375 grams plain flour
250 grams raisins	1 teaspoon baking powder
200 grams currants	1 teaspoon mixed spice
100 grams dates	200 mls sherry or brandy

METHOD

Chop fruits, mix together and soak in the sherry or brandy overnight. Sift together flour, baking powder and spice. Cream together butter and sugar. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition, then alternatively add the fruit and flour and lastly the chopped nuts. Mix thoroughly. Place mixture into a well prepared 19 - 22cm square tin, and bake in a slow oven for approx. 3 - 3½ hours.

Note: Fruit should be cut to the size of currants

HINTS FOR THE ABOVE COMPETITION:

1. Cake should be cooked evenly all over—top, bottom and sides should be of even colour. Points to be deducted for uneven cooking.
2. Cake must be well cooked right through—no damp or soggy patches.

**REGULATIONS
OF
MAITLAND AGRICULTURAL, HORTICULTURAL AND
FLORICULTURAL SOCIETY INC.**

1. Subscriber's privileges:-
 - (a) Each subscriber to be a member of the Society with a vote and a voice in its proceedings.
 - (b) Each ticket admits the bearer to the pavilion and grounds during the Current Show.
 - (c) A subscription of \$15.00 entitles a member to one member's ticket and one complimentary ticket. Junior members \$2.00.
 - (d) Life Membership Fees:-
 - A person 30 years or under 10 years Annual members Subscription plus \$75.00.
 - A person 31-40 years 10 years Annual members Subscription plus \$50.00.
 - A person 41-50 years 10 years Annual members Subscription plus \$25.00.
 - A person over 50 years 10 years Annual members Subscription.
2. Admission to the ground and pavilion: Adults \$10.00; Children of school age \$5.00; under school age, free.
3. Entries close as per detail on each Section and should be made on the form provided.
4. Where possible entries in different Sections should be made on separate entry forms for each Section.
5. All entry fees are to be paid to the Secretary prior to lodgement of exhibits.
6. The Show building will be open for the reception of exhibits at 8:00am on the day of the show and no entries will be admitted into the building after 9:00am. The building will be cleared of all persons except the Judges and Stewards at 10:00am sharp when judging will commence.
7. General entry into pavilion on completion of judging.
8. Stock shall be on the ground not later than 9:30am on the day of the Show. All horse stock shall be led around for examination by the Judges. Entire horses shall not be allowed to compete in either saddle or harness, jumping and trotting excepted.
9. All exhibits shall be the bona fide property of the exhibitor. All pot plants shall be established in pots and shall have been in the possession of the exhibitor for at least three months previously. No exhibit entered in the name of more than one person unless a bona fide firm shall be qualified to receive a prize.
10. Each exhibit will have its proper name attached where practicable and any exhibitor giving a wrong description of his or her exhibit with the intention of deceiving or defrauding the Society shall be debarred from exhibiting at the next Show and the particulars of the case shall be published in the Society's proceedings.
11. All exhibitors shall place their exhibits in the space allotted to them by the Committee of Management. Arrangement of exhibits commences at 8:00am sharp.

13. Prizes and competitors names may be affixed to the exhibit after the Judges have made their awards.
14. The signing of the entry form for the exhibit is accepted by the Committee as a guarantee that the animal specified thereon is free from all diseases as far as is known to the owner and in case of infectious disease being spread through or by exhibits the exhibitor only not the Society shall be held responsible therefore.
15. Exhibitors are responsible for the actions, doings or sayings of their authorised managers, agents or attendants.
16. The Society shall not be held responsible under any circumstances whatever for the exhibits for any damage or injuries thereto or for any loss or misdeliver thereof.
17. The Committee will appoint skilful persons as Experts and Judges who in forming their opinion will particularly attend to the instructions to be delivered for their guidance.
18. All persons causing annoyance by loud comments on the decisions of the judges or by unseemly or insulting behaviour shall after having been cautioned by a member of the Committee or Secretary be expelled from the Show grounds.
19. All entries are received on the condition that in the event of a protest the Steward's decision shall be final without recourse.
20. No tents, booths or hawkers shall be allowed on the grounds without permission of the Secretary.
21. All prizes not claimed within two months after the Show will be absolutely forfeited to the Society.
22. No exhibitor can remove any exhibit before 7:30pm unless pre-arranged with convenor.
23. Any prize awarded by the Judges which may be withheld in consequence of a valid protest will be forfeited to the Society.
24. Any award made by the Judges in contravention of the regulations of the Society may be revised by the Committee.
25. The Judges are empowered to withhold prizes where exhibits are considered unworthy. They may award second and third prizes.
26. The Judges shall come on the ground at the time appointed and commence their duties at once. Each Judge shall be furnished with a copy of Rules and Regulations which must be strictly adhered to. The Judges must mark against each prize in the List the number of exhibitor to whom they award each prize.
